

**This week marks the beginning of the OFE Growers 15th year of working with students at Oak Forest to bring them science and math experimentation in the OFE Gardens.** When this program was first envisioned by Debbie Krenek and Vivian Cardoso, who are both now retired OFE teachers, the thought was to have an area where students could have a hands-on gardening experience. The first garden was a plowed area on the south side of the building. Mr. Wolf, a friend of the Kreneks hauled in trailers of soil amendments and did the plowing. A picture of that first garden in 2003 is on the front cover of the student gardening manual. How the program has grown since then! At the end of the last school year, the main garden was officially dedicated as the Deborah Krenek Teaching Garden.

Over the years, hundreds of parents, teachers, and community members have volunteered thousands of hours to make the garden areas what they are today. In the past calendar year, over two tons of produce was grown in the gardens. During the school year almost all produce goes home with 5<sup>th</sup> graders. During the summer, excess produce is preserved to be used as a fundraiser to pay the garden expenses. During the last school year those expenses were over \$9500 for materials, supplies, and spending on new infrastructure. In addition to sales of the preserves, we were able to obtain grants from ExxonMobil and an \$800 contribution from the PTA. Your help in donating generously in our “donations for preserves” program are important to keeping the program alive for future students at the school. This week, the volunteers will meet with two classes of 5<sup>th</sup> graders on Thursday. During this orientations session, volunteer teachers will take the students on a pictorial tour of the campus and the areas they will be working. Safety is always an important lesson and will be emphasized during this orientation. **Safety is No Accident!** Mrs. Sanders will be discussing “good garden practices” and what is expected of the students. Students will also get a chance to meet the awesome volunteers who give up one day a week to teach the students so many valuable lessons.
